Talmud, Menachot, 43b, teaches that a person should say 100 blessings each day. How do you

find time – or enough things to be grateful for – to support 100 blessings a day?!

Our tradition offers blessings for every moment and miracle – from eating different types of food, to the first sight of a rainbow, to the first steps a new baby takes, to the last minutes before burial – the sacred and mundane are all moments for awe.

Some Brachot are thank you notes to God, or each other, while others are a chance to fulfill a sacred act that might seem ordinary.

We are in a season of thanksgiving. I am writing this article at the beginning of Sukkot, our festival of harvest thanksgiving, but by the time you read it we will be just a few weeks before the arrival of our country's Thanksgiving.

From Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur and in this season of gratitude, it seemed like a good time to consider some of our Temple blessings that are too easily taken for granted.

everyone who helped make those memories happen, including Rabbi Zimmerman, Cantor Shoshana Abrams Kaikov, Music Director John Sauvey, Executive Director Renée Woods, Executive Assistant Pattie Wood, the MRJ, the WRJ, Ruth Roper and Jane Oderberg, who coordinated our High Holy Days honors, the streamers who made our services available online, and our Beth-El staff. Those congregational events require many hours of

hard work and preparation, and they could not have happened without the efforts of our staff and volunteers.

This year again, I had the privilege of addressing the congregation on Rosh Hashana morning. With your help, Beth-El will continue to promote the core Jewish values of kehillah (community), kvod (respect), and chesed (kindness). Our congregational retreat at Greene Family Camp is Nov. 1-3. As we move toward the end of the year, Beth-El will also get ready to celebrate Chanukah.

Religious School is off to a great start this year. If you have children

Our Beth-El youth continue to be engaged. We celebrated Tot Shabbat on Sept. 20. The Junior Mac-

The Sacred Act of Baking Challah

Thursday nights are for baking challah in our home. And it's a process.

My kids know that as I am preparing dinner on Thursday evenings, I am also making challah dough so it can be set aside and rise as we carry on with our weeknight family routine. Yeast, flour, sugar, eggs, water, a pinch of salt, a splash of oil, and all my love. I never really follow a recipe, and somehow this combination of ingredients in just the right proportions is pure magic – or maybe even divine!

Once my kids are asleep, I tiptoe back to the kitchen and get to work. Sometimes I even put my ear buds in and listen to my favorite Jewish music. It is a labor of love – the island will ultimately be covered in flour, sticky dough, and drops of egg wash. The sink will be

filled with dirty dishes, and I will be cleaning the kitchen until forever. But, in a matter of a few short hours, a certain calm comes over our home and it feels as though

Shabbat is truly on its way.

There is something so sacred and meditative about the act of making challah. Sometimes I feel as though it is a form of prayer all its own. Maybe it's the gentle rhythm of kneading and braiding the dough each week that helps me connect with my ancestors. Maybe it's the quiet in my home when everyone is asleep that helps me converse with the divine and process the ups and downs of the week. Maybe it's the act of braiding challah that reminds me that we are all interwoven and connected as a Jewish people.

My family knows that one of the greatest ways I show my love for them

is by cooking and baking for them. It has always been a passion of mine, and on the weeks when life is particularly

> hectic and I don't get to make challah, we all miss it. No matter how tired or overwhelmed I may feel, I look forward to my Thursday night ritual.

As the loaves bake in the oven, a special aroma permeates through our home. It is the smell of Shabbat, and it lets us all know the rhythm of our week is about to change – a beautiful reminder that this day of rest is what has sustained our people through the generations.

If you've never tried baking challah, I highly recommend it. Even if baking is not your thing, it is a great way to connect with your family and the Jewish tradition. Happy baking!

Finding Our Place in the Jewish Puzzle of Life:

Tuesdays at noon, Nov. 12 and 19

Have you ever been asked why you are Jewish and found yourself groping for an answer? Has your son or daughter asked you why he or she has to have a bar or bat mitzvah and you found yourself speechless?
