Curious About Conversion

Classes begin September 3



Do you know someone who is not Jewish but who has expressed a serious interest in Judaism? The class meets monthly on Tuesday nights.

All who are interested in conversion can explore the customs and culture, festivals and philosophy of Judaism. This year-long class meets monthly and looks at some of the broad themes and ideas, customs and concepts of Jewish life as well as offers participants a a safe place to ask questions and to meet others who have already converted.

A prerequisite for this class is an in-person conversation with Rabbi Zimmerman and a commitment to the readings and assignments that are a part of the initial conversion process. While taking this class is a requirement for conversion, it does not commit one to converting. Contact Rabbi Zimmerman with any questions or for more information about this ongoing class.

Finding Our Place in the Jewish Puzzle of Life: A Search for Personal Theology with Rabbi Zimmerman

Have you ever been asked why you are Jewish and found yourself groping for an answer? Has your son or daughter asked you why he or she has to have a Bar or Bat Mitzvah and you knew it mattered but found yourself speechless? As you confront evangelicals with a sure sense of afterlife theology, do you find yourself unable to articulate your own religious belief system?

A conversation without easy answers, this twice monthly class will study philosophers, current articles, interviews and explore Jewish history and texts all with the goal of articulating a personal theology. If this conversation appeals to you, please consider joining us.







MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN A CHILD'S LIFE



In just one hour a week, you can help first grade children learn to love reading by becoming a Reading Mentor in a joint Beth-El/Ahavath Sholom program.

You'll be paired with first graders at nearby Westcliff Elementary on South Drive and work one-on-one with one or two children for 30 minutes weekly during the school year, from mid-October through May. If you have a conflict or are traveling,

a substitute tutor can cover for you.

No experience is needed; just attend a 90-minute training session to learn how to help a child improve his/her reading skills using a simple, structured guide.

Not only do the students improve their reading skills and confidence, but they also typically do better overall both academically and socially.
