We throw decorum to the wind and, in the face of imminent danger, we say: "Come and get me! Give me your best shot! I can take it!"

Purim is an act of holy defiance.

This year Purim feels even more pertinent, because it's one thing to rejoice when things seem safe and calm. It's another to do it when we have plenty of reasons to be fearful, as we do this year. Purim is a reminder there will always be enemies. Danger is just around the cor-

ner. But even in our sadness, we raise our heads high at Purim.

Some of you are probably thinking Rabbi is just seeking an excuse for his crazy behavior. It's true, Purim is one of my favorite holidays.

Growing up, many of us were taught not to make noise,

laugh, or have too much fun at temple. Religion, we were told, is serious business.

But Purim is more than just loud, joyful noise. It is also an act of defiance.

As we lock the doors of our temples and wonder whether it's safe for our children to proclaim their Jewish identity, Purim says there will always be danger but there must always be Jewish joy.

This is not just a Rabbi Brian thing. The thousand-year-old Mishnah Torah teaches that the Scroll of Esther will be read and remain relevant even when the books of the prophets are no longer read. The Scroll of Esther will stand tall alongside the Torah in messianic times.

The 1,300-year-old collection of teachings known as Midrash Mishlei goes further, explaining that even at the end of time, Purim will be celebrated when all other holidays except Yom Kippur are irrelevant.

What is the power of this holiday?

Passover follows only four weeks later and brings a somber, serious message about our responsibility to redeem ourselves and our world. But before it

arrives, Purim teaches us Judaism is for living and laughing, children and joy. Even in the darkest of times, Purim remains relevant.

I hope you will join us the weekend of March 22 for three days of Purim song and celebration, culminating

on Sunday morning with our Religious School children putting on a Purim play and enjoying a school carnival.

Before we can be redeemed at Passover, let's remind ourselves that how we live now also matters.

Purim Sameach, Happy Purim. Yes, even more so, right now.

Greetings. I'm writing this column on the eve of that great American ritual,

the Super Bowl. By the time you read this, our World Series winning Texas Rangers will have played their first spring training game on Feb. 23 against the Kansas City Royals. Go Rangers!

Beth-El Congregation has had an eventful winter season. During the mid-January cold snap, a pipe in the fire sprinkler system in the education wing froze and burst, flooding the north end of the building. Water damaged the carpet, ceiling, drywall, and bookshelves, all of which will have to be replaced. We have made an insurance claim, but we do not yet know its outcome. Emergency repairs have been made, but the replacement of the flooring and cabinetry will take time. The flood and resulting damage have inconvenienced the Religious School, the Congregation in general, and our tenant, Playhouse Academy. I thank and commend our Executive Director Amy Robbins, our Religious School Director Shoshana Abrams-Kaikov, and our hardworking staff for managing the problems and making the best of a challenging situation.

The Congregation had an extremely successful and well-attended MRJ Shabbat dinner and service in the gathering area on Jan. 26. Community Mitzvah Day on Jan. 28 was also a great success. Children and adults from all Tarrant County religious schools participated.

Our kindergarten and first-grade classes celebrated their Consecration on Feb. 9. Brad Sham, the voice of the Dallas Cowboys, will appear and speak at an MRJ and WRJ sponsored brunch on March 3 to raise money for Jewish Camp Scholar-

ships. Beth-El Congregation will celebrate Purim the weekend of March 22-24.

Our youth groups are thriving. Cindy and I took the BEJY kids to the movie *Wonka* in January. On Feb. 11, we took them to a trampoline park. BEJY is open to all congregants in 5th-7th grade. The Beth-El Junior Maccabees, our youngest age group, held its first event Feb. 10 at an indoor playground. The Maccabees, for 2nd-4th grade, will have their first event this spring.

Then and Now: Legacy of Leadership

Since 1913, five men on the Simon family tree have served as presidents of Beth-El.

The first was Uriah Meyer Simon, a

Mississippi native raised in Tyler, Texas. After graduating from the University of Denver College of Law in 1904, he moved to Fort Worth and worked as a prosecutor for the Tarrant County District Attorney. At Beth-El, Simon had a role model — David Brown, who was his brother-in-law and cousin as well as Temple president and a founding member at Beth-El.

Uriah Simon became the local point person for the Industrial Removal Office, an agency that screened immigrants struggling in New York and matched them with jobs in Fort Worth. Among those immigrants was the Moses family, whose descendants at Beth-El include Buddy and Rochelle Moses, Alyson Moses Halpern, her husband, Blake, and their children, Ryder and Ledger. Uriah Simon also helped resettle the Zalefsky family, whose sons shortened their surname to Zale and became famous international jewelers and philanthropists.


The next Simon to step into Beth-El's circle of leadership was U.M. Simon's son, attorney Richard U. Simon, Sr. He became Temple president in 1943. In the middle of his term, he resigned to serve as a WWII Army officer in Europe. A decade later, his brother Henry W. Simon, Sr., an attorney, became Beth-El president. His son, Henry W. Simon, Jr., another lawyer, sat on the bimah as Temple president in 1977 and 1978.

Compromise is an important value in judgment. The Talmud teaches: "Rebbe Yehoshua ben Korcha says, compromise


is a mitzvah, as it is written (Zecharia 8:16), 'Judge truth and judgment of peace in your gates.' Seemingly when there is judgment there is no peace, and when there is peace, there is no judgment. But what is the judgment that encompasses peace as well? This is compromise."

On Jan. 16, a fire sprinkler head burst in Beth-El's education wing, resulting in significant flooding damage. Since then, Beth-El Congregation and staff, the Religious School, Playhouse Academy, and several Temple members have had to compromise.

Compromise is a pragmatic approach that enables people to get things done. It is better to create a solution where everyone benefits, where each side compromises a bit to maintain peace. I am grateful to witness this.


back to the chateau for what is considered a reunion. Amid winery tours, market visits, and fancy dinners, it becomes clear each woman has a hidden reason for returning to the estate after all these years. Very quickly the secrets and lies turn into a fast-paced murder mystery.



Kunstlers in Paradise by Cathleen Schine

This Jewish Book Council pick is a clever, hilarious, and deeply affecting novel that tells the story of Mamie, who escaped Vienna in 1939 with her family. They made their way to California, where they joined a colony of distinguished

musicians, writers, and intellectuals also escaping Hitler. Now, at age 93, Mamie gets a visit from her grandson, Julian, who is seeking fame and fortune in Hollywood. But it's 2020 and the pandemic sweeps in, cutting Julian and Mamie off from the world. In isolation, she shares stories of her early escapades with the likes of Thomas Mann to Greta Garbo, and it opens a new a world for Julian of lives that came before him.
